# Flu Season – Recommendation from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

While seasonal influenza (flu) viruses can be detected year-round in the United States, flu viruses are most common during the fall and winter. The exact timing and duration of flu seasons can vary, but influenza activity often begins to increase in October. Most of the time flu activity peaks between December and March. The CDC recommends that people get vaccinated against flu soon after the vaccine becomes available. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against the flu. Doctors and nurses are encouraged to begin vaccinating their patients soon after the vaccine becomes available, preferably by October. Those children aged 6 months through 8 years who need two doses of vaccine should receive the first dose as soon as possible to allow time to get the second dose before the start of flu season. The two doses should be given at least four weeks apart. In addition to getting a seasonal flu vaccine, we can all take everyday preventive actions by frequently washing our hands with soap and water to reduce the spread of germs.

#### October - Breast Cancer Awareness Month

A major focus of October is Breast Cancer Awareness referred to as National Breast Cancer Awareness Month (NBCAM). This is an annual campaign organized by major breast cancer charities every October to increase awareness of the disease and to raise funds for research into its cause, prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cure. The campaign also offers information and support to those affected by breast cancer.

A variety of events will take place in October, including walks and runs, and the pink illumination of landmark buildings.

In our own community in 2008, Opelousas General Health System started the "Paint The Town Pink" initiative. This program promotes breast cancer awareness, education, and free mammography for eligible men and women in our community. In conjunction with National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Opelousas General Health System will again "Paint the Town Pink" during the month of October 2016! 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NBCAM was founded in 1985 as a partnership between the American Cancer Society and the pharmaceutical division of Imperial Chemical Industries (now part of AstraZeneca, producer of several anti-breast cancer drugs). The aim of NBCAM has been to promote mammography as an effective diagnostic tool in the fight against breast cancer.

In 1993 Evelyn Lauder, Senior Corporate Vice President of the Estée Lauder Companies, founded The Breast Cancer Research Foundation and established the pink ribbon as its symbol, though this was not the first time the ribbon was used to symbolize breast cancer. In the fall of 1991, the Susan G. Komen Foundation handed out pink ribbons to participants in its New York City race for breast cancer survivors.
