Celebration of Thanksgiving

Many people trace the origins of the modern Thanksgiving Day to the harvest celebration that the pilgrims held in Plymouth, Massachusetts in 1621. However, their first true thanksgiving was in 1623, when they gave thanks for rain that ended a severe drought. In the following years, these early thanksgivings took the form of a special church service, rather than a feast of food.

In the second half of the 1600s, thanksgivings after the harvest became more common and started to become annual events. However, it was celebrated on different days in different communities and in some villages there were more than one thanksgiving remembrance each year.

George Washington, our first president of the United States, proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving Day in 1789. Later, President Abraham Lincoln declared the last Thursday in November as a national day of thanksgiving. It was not until 1941 that Congress finally made Thanksgiving Day an official national holiday.

With all that has occurred this year, what will be different at Thanksgiving and, more important, are we different? What values shape our lives as a result of the challenges of 2020? Are we more compassionate and caring or are we more critical and cynical? Are we more accepting of people different from us or are we more fearful and judgmental of them? Are we hoarding goods or sharing with those who lack basic essentials? Are we able to strip away our differences and see, really see, that we are one humanity created in the image and likeness of our Creator? This year while enjoying good food and fellowship, let us follow the tradition of our ancestors and take time to pause and render thanksgiving for our many blessings.

Lord God, Creator and source of goodness and love, look kindly upon us and receive our heartfelt gratitude at this special time. We thank You for all the graces and blessings You have so graciously bestowed upon us, both spiritual and temporal. We thank You for – our faith and religious heritage; food and shelter; leisure and work; our country and those who serve to protect it; our family, friends, and neighbors both near and far.
